Logic models enhance grant proposals by clarifying what the project is trying to accomplish, the stakeholder benefits, and later on serve as a project planning, management and assessment tool. The workshop will be divided into 3 main steps (see agenda). We will first demonstrate each step, before working in small groups to focus on a section of the logic model. Each step will then be followed by group discussion. We will also be joined by a guest speaker who will share his experience in logic model development for proposal writing.
